

Some of the trees found in Formby Pinewoods and their uses

Name	Diagram/Photo/Picture	Description	Uses
Beech		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Broad shape • smooth, silver/grey bark • wavy edged, egg shaped leaves • seeds are a woody husk • up to 40m tall 	Widely used in creating furniture and other items such as boats and instruments.
Sycamore		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Broad shape • large maple shaped leaves up to 20cm wide • deep green colour • yellow drooping flowers • up to 30m tall 	Used for creating furniture.
Hawthorn		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Thorns • green/red berries • creamy white flowers • Small tree, up to 12m tall 	Berries are used in medicine. Wood is used to make furniture, firewood and charcoal.
Corsican Pine		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • grey/green needles • yellow/brown cones • Up to 40m tall 	Used in general building work. Often used for railways, telegraph poles and making into plywood.
